## HERE'S WHAT WE ARE DOING!

We plan to provide a periodic update of the activities and actions that are taking place that relate to the District's Strategic Plan that was developed last year. It will serve as a guide as well as a good way to communicate the results of the plan. The plan is scheduled to take place over the next five years so some items will not appear in the initial update. There will be items that we are just starting to address while others are a "work-in-progress" and some may even be completed! We publicized the entire plan in the October newsletter so you should use that as a "guide" to what is actually in the plan and scheduled to be addressed over the next few months and years.

On November $16^{\text {th }}$ a public presentation was made following a meeting with the CORE Team. The meeting reviewed the four (4) major "Task Forces" that were developed, strategic intents, key initiatives and the action plans that were developed to address the various areas the group targeted. The "plan" is a living document that will be adjusted and modified as we begin to address the many issues that were identified. Below is a summary of what is going on and what we are currently working on.
$\checkmark$ Items that have been addressed
$\rightarrow$ Items that we are "working on!"

## Systems and Structures

$\checkmark$ Look closely at the "transitional points" (Pre-K to K, 5 to 6, 8 to 9) in an effort analyze the relationship between the curricular obstacles and challenges presented to students and the cognitive and developmental needs of students
$\checkmark$ Implemented some major design changes to $6^{\text {th }}$ grade and divided the year into two distinct phases (elementary and middle school)
$\checkmark$ Accelerated math students were identified and scheduled separately
$\checkmark$ Expanded the opportunity for students to be placed in accelerated courses
$\checkmark$ Expanded college level offerings for our students (Physics, Calculus, Ceramics)
$\checkmark$ Redesigned the structure and size of ELA classes in grades 7-8
$\checkmark$ Increased the academic support resources in the middle schools
$\checkmark$ Restructured the delivery of special education services in grades K-12
$\checkmark$ "Principals Cabinet" has been developed to give students a greater voice in their school
$\rightarrow$ Working specifically with teachers by grade levels and departments to update their curriculum and address instructional gaps
$\rightarrow$ Emphasize the importance of developing additional opportunities for students that take place outside the
home whether they are school or community based
$\rightarrow$ We will be starting a program called "Fit and Fun" in January 2010 designed to increase physical fitness and healthy choices
$\rightarrow$ In the process of developing an after school program for students with a variety of activities planned
$\rightarrow$ In the process of developing a curriculum map for technology that will integrate skills across grade levels and content areas

## Fiscal and Facilities

$\checkmark$ Develop and maintain a long term plan for programming and budget (three years)
$\checkmark$ Manage reserves in a fiscally responsible manner
$\checkmark$ Collaborate with other school districts and BOCES to reduce costs and develop economies of scale
$\checkmark$ Find alternative funding opportunities
$\checkmark$ Maintain a stable tax levy ... 2009-10 budget and tax levy were $3 \%$ less than 2008-09!
$\checkmark$ District voters approved the establishment of a Capital Reserve Account to assist with the local share of future capital projects
$\rightarrow$ Develop a brochure to assist in marketing our school and community
$\rightarrow$ Study district finances to determine fixed costs versus variable costs
$\rightarrow$ Use the Building Condition Survey in assessing the physical condition of our building as we look to meet the instructional and program needs for $21^{\text {st }}$ century learners
$\rightarrow$ Develop a long range plan for the improvement and modernization of facilities

## Academic Excellence and Rigor

$\checkmark$ Review NYS Assessment Data
$\checkmark$ Communicate with schools and BOCES curriculum experts to better understand "strategies" that we can implement to improve our test results
$\checkmark$ Provide professional development opportunities for our staff to assist in formative assessment training to increase student success
$\checkmark$ Purchase new software designed to assist students with special needs
$\checkmark$ Activated the Parent Portal PowerSchool option for parents of students in grades 6-12 to access grades and attendance
$\rightarrow$ Guidance department introduced "Career Zone" to students in grades 6-12 to assist in developing a Career Plan for every student
$\rightarrow$ Introduce the use of RTI (Response To Intervention) as a strategy for students in grades K-4
$\rightarrow$ Begin the development of a competency based profile that will insure that our students will be prepared to successfully pursue post graduation plans
